## Secretary Minutes from March 18, 2017 General Meeting

President Sandie Hammel called the March meeting of the Shenandoah Valley Quilters Guild (SVQG) to order at 9:30 a.m. Fifty-nine members and guests were present. It was moved, seconded and carried (MSC) that the February minutes, as published in the newsletter, be approved.

The treasurer's report was presented by Larry Brown.

### Reports:

Nominating, Doreen Roadcap asked for volunteers to serve on the nominating committee to recruit officers for 2018.

Membership, John Hammel reminded that membership applications are available and announced that several new members had joined at the meeting.

Sunshine, Sue Jones reported that eight birthday cards and three thinking of you cards were sent.

Program, Barbara Cline reported that members had enjoyed a workshop on Friday, March 17 taught by Julia Graber. She announced that anyone wishing to sign up for the program, "From Photo to Fiber", being taught after the meeting could do so even if they had not brought a sewing machine to the meeting. The April program and workshop will be "String Quilts" taught by Phyllis Reeves. In June Sew Classics will provide the program and the workshop. Information and sign-up forms for the programs will be in the upcoming newsletters.

Virginia Quilt Museum, Josephine Millet reported that the museum is open. The program, "From Fabric to Photos: The Forest Project", will be given by Dawn Flores on Saturday, March 25. Members are asked to consult the VQM website for information. On the lower level of the museum, The Top of Virginia Quilt Guild has an exhibit.

The Show and Tell portion of the meeting featured the Divide and Conquer challenge, PhD projects completed, and pieces created in Friday's "Patches" workshop taught by Julia Graber.

After refreshments, the raffle was won by Doreen Roadcap. Twelve attendees also won door prizes. Barbara Cline introduced the speaker, Julia Graber, who provided an entertaining trunk show of her work.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

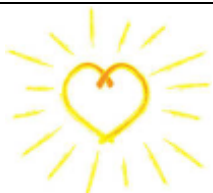

Current Exhibits (Feb 21 - May 20, 2017)

"Two Golden Ages of Applique: 1840-1870 & 1920-1940"  
Curated by Debby Cooney

Quilt historian Debby Cooney explores various forms of applique on quilts and other textiles in the historical context of two different eras. For several years she has studied, written about, and collected applique quilts. She shares these and quilts from other private collections with visitors in this wide-ranging exhibition.

As Debby explains it, the popularity of the difficult art of applique has waxed and waned since colonial times. Applique quilt maker skills can best be seen in the years 1840 to 1870, and in a revival from 1920 to 1940. Both periods produced significant outpourings of appliqued quilts that feature excellence in design, technical skill, and expert quilting.

We hope that seeing the intricately beautiful applique on these quilts will inspire modern quilters to join in the applique movement that Debby believes has planted us solidly in a time that will be seen as the "Third Golden Age of Applique."

## Programs - April

### String Quilts

Instructor: Phyllis Reeves

#### General Supply List for Students

1. Pins, seam ripper, rotary cutter (with new blade) and mat
2. Thread
3. Ruler for trimming up squares (at least 10" long)
4. Sewing machine in good working order with  $\frac{1}{4}$ " foot
5. Pencil or marker
6. 80 Jeans needle or 80 Topstitch needle for machine
7. Cheap thin copy paper at least 7" square or foundation paper
8. Strips of fabric between 1"-2" wide and anything in between.

#### Basic String Quilt

1. Thin copy paper cut into squares. Decide on the size of your blocks and cut accordingly. My squares were 7"
2. Background fabric cut into 1" strips. I used white but you could use any neutral that will show up against your other strips,
3. Fabric Glue Stick

#### Diamond Square Strings

1. Quarter Square Triangle ruler such as Omnigrid 98L or Strip Tube Ruler from Cozy Quilt designs (my preference)
2. Background fabric cut into  $3\frac{1}{4}$ " strips wof.
3. Fabric for sashing, borders, and binding.

#### Before Class:

Decide which quilt top you would like to make. Either one can be made as small or large as you like. Cut both your scraps and background fabric into the appropriate sizes.
