## President's Message -

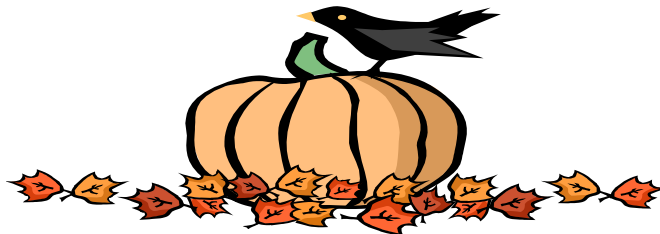


Hurrah, hurrah **October's** here

September 20, 2014**

The September meeting of the Shenandoah Quilters Guild was called to order by Molly Toth, guild president.

## **SHENANDOAH VALLEY APPLIQUE SOCIETY**

October is special to me because 3 years ago the Shenandoah Valley Applique Society held its first meeting. What a wonderful 3 years it has been for Applique. I do not know what it is but there is something so exciting about Applique. Anyone who knows me knows that it is definitely my passion.

The Applique Society has taken on a very special project for the Virginia Quilt Museum. We will be reproducing the Botanical Album Quilt made in 1859 by Esther Matthews (1776-1866) for her grandson, Addison Blair Martz. Addison enlisted in the Virginia Infantry on April 18, 1861, two days before Robert E. Lee resigned his commission in the U. S. Army to follow Virginia into the Confederacy. The quilt illustrates a sense of local attachment because Esther chose 25 blocks of wildflowers and garden favorites native to Addison's Virginia home. I think of Esther who was born during the Revolutionary War and died not long after the Civil War ended. What a privilege it is to reproduce a quilt made by this wonderful woman who lived and survived through so much in her lifetime. I believe that while Esther worked her Applique on this quilt for her grandson, Addison, that it brought her peace and comfort, as Applique brings to me.

The Shenandoah Valley Applique Society meets on the third Tuesday of every month at the County Library in Edinburg from 1:00-4:00 pm. At the present time, we have 15 members. All who are interested in the art of Applique are welcome.

**Dear Guild Members,**

Following are the results from the 2014 Raffle Quilt/Quilt Show Survey (RQ/QS). There were only 8 questionnaires turned in. The RQ and QS will be discussed and voted on at the October Meeting. Raffle Quilt tickets are sold at the Quilt Show. While they both share the same questionnaire and are often thought of together, they are entirely separate and operate and function independent from each other. I hope everyone has given both the RQ and QS serious consideration. I think the final vote of these two topics will have a big affect on and perception of the Shenandoah Valley Quilt Guild in the future.

**Jan Hood, Raffle Quilt Committee**

1. Do you think The Guild should do a raffle quilt in 2015-16?  
6 "Yes"; 1 had a ? mark; 1 "Maybe".  
Remark to Yes: "This is what guilds do."
2. If No, to #1, what should the Guild do to raise money for its activities?  
"A bingo game every other year."  
"The bingo game idea mentioned at Aug. mtg. sounded like a profitable idea."
3. Do you think The Guild should have a quilt show in 2016?  
7 "Yes. The show is a great way to showcase who we are and what we do."; 1 "No" with note in #4.  
Remark to Yes: This is what guilds do.
4. If No to #3, is there another activity The Guild should undertake?  
"A combination show/raffle quilt/fundraiser sounds like fun."
5. If the Guild does a raffle quilt in 2015-16, should we share the proceeds with a partner non-profit?  
5 "Yes"; 2 "No"; 1 left blank  
"There are many organizations that could use the money & not all may be in a position to sell tickets. I think it should be a request not a requirement."
6. If Yes to #5, should the organization be required to sell raffle tickets?  
2 "Yes"; 3 "No"; 3 left blank  
Remark to No: "If this were so, what would the word 'charity' mean?"

Additional comments on the above:

"Since I travel a great deal, I can't always work at the quilt show. When here, I work all three days."

"The organization should be one willing to sell tickets since they will receive some of the benefits. Almost any charity is willing to partner with organizations to raise money."

"The success of any raffle quilt depends on the selling of the tickets! Also, the "impact" the quilt has on the viewer! If one does not like the quilt, they don't sell tickets!"

"How about a theme quilt display on the walls of the venue? Guild members could select among the submissions via voting if there are too many to hang. We could do this once a year since it would be MUCH less work to set up."

"Bingo has been done in other guilds & they say it is a lot less work & it makes good money."

"If the organization is "required" to sell tickets, this would prohibit very needy organizations from receiving money from us, as some are prohibited from selling raffle tickets. The amount donated could always be determined after determining the profit amount. Having a Raffle Quilt & Show also brings awareness of our Quilt Guild to the public."

Fabric (sample uses blues and greens):

- ¼ yard "sky" fabric
- ¼ yard "grass" fabric
- ¼ yard "rock" or "pebble" fabric
- ¼ yard small scale flower fabric
- 1 panel or 1 yard of "base fabric"
- Variety of fabrics in a variety of colors with elements such as houses, animals, lighthouses, cards, trees, bushes etc. of various size and scale

### Additional Supplies:

- 1 foam core board for use as a portable design wall
- 1 yard fusible web (Heat N Bond recommended)
- 1 large glue stick
- 14"x20" piece of batting (Warm and Natural recommended)
- Colored pencils or markers

### Sewing Supplies:

- Scissors
- Pins
- Scissors that can cut very small pieces of fabric
- Small iron and ironing mat/board
- Extension cord and power strip
- Basic sewing supplies

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## **Lonestar Strip Magic with Flying Geese Border**

**Quilt Size is 30" x 30"**

Three (3) hour class: Skilled beginner or intermediate level

**Date:** Saturday, November 15, 2014, 1:00 PM-4:00 PM

Most quilters don't think 2½" strips and diamond units are very compatible but the truth is they were practically made for each other! Using the EZ Jelly Roll Ruler and 2½" strips (either from a pre-cut bundle or your own stash of fabrics) Kimberly will teach you to quickly and expertly strip-piece and cut diamond wedges and construct a traditional-style Lonestar block. The magic with her method is there are no "Y" or set-in seams! Sound impossible? Not with Kimberly's signature technique and precision-pieced method! Simply choose 3 fabrics for the star and additional strips for the fabulous flying geese border (which is made from strips using no math, no wasted fabric and no stress!) plus one background fabric and you'll be finished in no time at all!

**Supplies Needed** (Note: Kimberly will have her EZ Jelly Roll Rulers and EZ Flying Geese Rulers available for a special discount to guild members.)

- EZ Jelly Roll Ruler by Kimberly Einmo OR a rotary ruler with a 45 degree line
- EZ Flying Geese Ruler by Kimberly Einmo
- Fabric as outlined in Fabric Requirements chart below
- 45 mm (or larger) rotary cutter and rotary mat
- 10½" (or larger) square ruler (optional, but very helpful for squaring up blocks)
- Neutral sewing thread
- Sewing Machine in good working order and extension cord in good working order
- Iron and ironing mat and extension cord or power strip in good working order
- Basic Sewing Supplies such as scissors, straight pins, general sewing supplies, seam ripper
- Bring anything you might need to make your classroom experience more efficient, stress-free, and enjoyable!

(Think: extra light, extension cord, a cushion to sit on, magnifying or reading glasses, something to drink in a cup with a spill proof lid, chocolate... and most importantly, a sense of fun!)

**Fabric Requirements** – Bring all fabric except batting and backing with you to class. You may bring 1 – Jelly Roll bundle to class plus ½ yard of background fabric OR you may bring yardage as outlined below:

### **FABRIC YARDS CUTTING**

#1 – Center of star and checker border - 1/8 yard  Cut 1 – 2½" strip

#2 – Radiant row (middle) of star - 1/8 yard □ Cut 2 – 2½” strips

#3 – Outer star points - 1/8 yard □ Cut 1 – 2½” strip

**Lonestar Strip Magic with Flying Geese (continued)**

#4 – Background fabric - 1¼ yard □ Cut 1 – 6¾” strip; subcut 4 – 6¾” x 6¾” squares. Cut each square 1x diagonally to yield 8 B triangles; □ Cut 1 – 5½” strip; subcut 4 – 5½” x 5½” squares and cut each square 1x (You will cut additional fabric in class) diagonally to yield 8 A triangles

#5 – Flying Geese border - Can use 1 fabric or 11 different fabrics ½ total yard

□ Cut 1 - 2½” strip from each of 11 different fabrics

OR

□ Cut 4 - 2½” strips from 1 fabric

Backing 1 yd □ 36” x 36”

Batting □ 36” x 36”
