PROGRAMS

Our September program, Quilting and the Computer: a Happy Pairing, will include a lecture in the morning and an afternoon workshop, focusing on improving our computer skills and increasing our confidence to use new quilting techniques and information. These interactive programs will be led by Gail Auen, an accomplished quilter as well as a computer guru. She will show us how the quilting world has grown with the use of the computer, color printers, iPhone, Touch Screen Tablet, and other peripherals to expand quilting resources and the quilting community. Gail will bring computer equipment to show us how to connect to the quilting community and in the workshop she will demonstrate special software to print our own quilt designs. Some of the things we will learn include how to print on fabric for hand piecing blocks, appliqué or half-square triangles, printing graphics on fabric, options to enhance and embellish quilts with thread, paints, beads, and much more. There will be time in the workshop for discussions of computer and quilt related questions. I plan to ask her how to download quilting podcasts to my iPod Touch! A workshop registration form and supply list are included in this newsletter. I hope you will join us.

SHENANDOAH VALLEY QUILTERS GUILD MEETING MINUTES July 17, 2010

President Barbara Linzey called the meeting to order and welcomed everyone. She introduced Benny Marshall, who was visiting the guild for the first time. Barbara had a call from a woman who worked for the city of Staunton; she needed a quilt block to be donated for a quilt commemorating the 75th anniversary of the Blue Ridge Parkway. Time was limited and Barbara undertook making the block herself. It was taken from the Augusta County seal and those present thought it quite wonderful. The quilt will be made of blocks from all the counties surrounding the Blue Ridge Parkway and we hope to have a picture of the quilt when it is completed.

The minutes for the June meeting were approved as printed in the Newsletter. Sally Jones gave the June treasurer's report, a copy of which is attached to these minutes.

Several committee positions remain to be filled. The Sunshine committee job is an "at home" job which basically consists of making Thinking of You (TOY) blocks and sending them to persons with birthdays or who have had an illness or a death in the family. We also need someone to take the Program Chair #2 position. Sandie Hammel will contact potential nominees before the August picnic. They can then be elected prior to the installation of officers at the picnic. Information will be included in the August Newsletter.

PROGRAM: Mary Carlton announced that today would be a mystery quilt with 18 members participating. The "Row by Row" round robin begins in August. Bring your row in a paper bag. See July Newsletter for details. Additional material (perhaps for sashing) can be included in the paper bag. The picnic will be held at the Community Center in Bridgewater.

Mary introduced Fran Miller (Program Chair #2). Fran discussed the programs planned for next year. The guild has had well over 100

different instructors and many have become nationally known. Her goal is to bring at least three major quilt instructors to SVQG during the year. Molly Toth will chair one program centered on learning new skills. Service projects are being turned out by the Service Bee that is meeting on a regular basis. In finding new areas of need, the "Wrap a Smile" program, which is world-wide, has been a new focus.

The calendar for the year starts with Gail Auen, computer guru and long term quilter, in September. In October popular teacher Augusta Cole will return. November will be service projects and December will be the Christmas party. January will be our annual auction of gently used quilting items and in February Fran has a verbal commitment from Gaylene Fitzgerald. She is working on a domestic machine quilting class. March is "National Quilt Day," and a party would be appropriate to celebrate. April will be education and in May the founder of "Wrap a Smile" has been approached to do a program to include the local Rotary Club that sponsors these efforts. June will be on art quilts. Sara Ann Smith is the proposed teacher. The July program is not as yet planned.

Fran asked everyone to save their empty spools as this is one indication of the amount of work we do. Bring them to meetings starting in September. A "spool" block will be your reward. Barbara thanked Mary and Fran for their work during the past year.

SECRET PAL: Pam Nixon handed out the Secret Pal gifts. The year will end with a "reveal" in September.

NEWSLETTER: The Newsletter deadline will be Friday, July 23rd. Contact Vicki Graham (editor) if you are having any problem receiving your newsletter.

WAYS AND MEANS: Door prizes were given out to Gay Baker, Iris McCarthy, and Phyllis Hollowell.



The meeting was adjourned followed by refreshments and fellowship.

You put a starter row in a bag and turn it in to me when you come in the door. I'll write down your name and put a number on the bag. Do not put your name on the bag! You pick up a different bag after the break. You have 2 months to add a row to the one in the bag. Add sashing between the rows if it is appropriate. You may include fabric in your bag if you wish, but I think it's more interesting not to. There's only one rule at this point. Your initial row must be no larger than 60 1/2" by 12 1/2". We are not making queen size quilts. Everybody is welcome to join the Round Robin. Don't give me any nonsense about not being good enough. This is for all skill levels.
