

What does your membership do for you?


Now that you have all paid for your SVQG membership, it's time to think about all the benefits.

OUT-GOING PRESIDENT'S BLOCK

It is time to make blocks to thank our out-going President for her year of service. We need 12" (finished) Ohio Star Blocks with the star being red and the background white (not cream). Please give them to Barbara Linzey ASAP

Rotary Cutting Directions for 12" Block

For the Template A


- 1. Cut one 4 1/2" strip of each Fabric A (**red**-picture shows *blue*) and Fabric B (white)
- 2. Cut one 4 1/2" square from the Fabric A strip
- 3. Cut four 4 1/2" squares from the Fabric B strip

For the Template B

- 1. Cut one 5 1/4" strip of each Fabric A and Fabric B
- 2. Cut two 5 1/4" squares from each of the Fabric A and the Fabric B strips
- 3. Cut each 5 1/4" square in half on the diagonal
- 4. Cut each triangle in half on the diagonal. This will result in 8 Fabric A and 8 Fabric B quarter triangles

Piecing the Ohio Star Block

- 1. Piece 8 Fabric A triangles to 8 Fabric B triangles. This step can also be done using the <u>speed piecing</u> method for quarter triangles. The strips should be cut 5 1/4" wide for a 12" quilt block.
- 2. Piece the triangles created in step 1 together to form a square.
- 3. Piece 4 squares of Fabric B together with 2 triangular squares to form 2 strips
- 4. Piece 2 triangular squares with 1 square of Fabric A to form 1 strip
- 5. Piece the 3 strips together to form the completed Ohio Square quilt block

You have the skill in your hands to raise funds for the Virginia Quilt Museum!



Designated the "official quilt museum of the Commonwealth" by the General Assembly

What do you do when you want to submit items to The North Florida Fair and you are told that it does not meet the usual categories? You enter the category called "Articles of Merit Not Listed.". Needlework done by Carolyn Lynch in the 1960s was on the "wrong" fabric, stitched items were not sized "right" for the needlework categories at a Florida Fair. But her work won first prize in this new category. A few of the items from that fair survive to see today.

After 35 years of needlework and quilting, teaching quilt classes and being published in leading quilt magazines, you would expect Carolyn Lynch of McLean, VA to know and follow the rules of how to do those things. But Carolyn has never been able to control her creativity and sense of humor. The retrospective exhibit of her work at the Virginia Quilt Museum reflects her independence. After her move to Northern Virginia in the 1970s quilting took over Carolyn's imagination. Her husband, Wayne Lynch, is descended from original settlers of Virginia, George Yeardley and Temperance Flowerdew. Her first quilt was "An American Family" showing 16 generations and over 200 people. If you made only one quilt, wouldn't it be one that showed your family history? Look closely at this family quilt and find the block depicting the ancestor no one would discuss because "he drank."

There are a few traditional quilts and colors in the exhibit, but the Chiquita Banana dancing in the center of a quilt, the angry dragon jumping from the center of another or the tomb stone wall hanging will surprise and delight.

The exhibit "Articles of Merit Not Listed" is curated by Carolyn Lynch and Hazel Carter. Sponsors of the exhibit include Quilter's Unlimited of Northern Virginia, The Old Dominion Applique Society, individuals and quilting groups, the National Endowment for the Arts and the Virginia Commission for the Arts.

"Articles of Merit Not Listed" can be seen at the Virginia Quilt Museum from May 24 through September 3, 2011. The Museum is open Tuesday to Saturday from 10am to 4pm at 301 South Main Street, Harrisonburg, VA. Parking in the municipal lot behind the museum is free. Phone 540-433-3818 for more information and for groups.

Registration for Balinese Garden Workshop

DESCRIPTION: You will use fusible appliqué and your machine's decorative and utility stitches to make this pattern. You may make a pillow top, wall hanging, or table runner. You can quilt and complete your project at home. Don't forget your glasses!

Supplies:

- -a pattern sheet is provided but the pattern with instructions can be purchased from Sarah for \$12 but not needed for the class
- -background fabric, 20"X20" if making the pillow top or wall hanging; 16"X40" if making the table runner
- -appliqué fabric scraps for leaves and flowers, batiks work well
- -2 yds of yarn, ribbon or bias strip for flower stems
- -sewing machine (and manual) for straight and zig-zag stitches, blind stitch helpful but not necessary, extension cords
- extra machine needle-just in case!
- -large variety of colorful specialty threads (cotton, poly, rayon) to match or contrast with your fabrics
 - -basic sewing kit—including a seam ripper, plus paper and embroidery scissors
- -rotary cutting and ironing mats, if available—we will share
- -appliqué press sheet or parchment paper—will be supplied if needed
 - -fusible web with paper backing such as Wonder Under or Misty Fuse
 - -freezer paper/tear away stabilizer the size of your chosen background fabric
 - -scrap fabrics so you can do sample stitch-outs!!

DESCRIPTION: Come to play with a range of art techniques and supplies on this very handson class. Sarah will demonstrate several art techniques for you to try including painting, stamping, and using Shiva Paintstiks. Sarah will provide materials for a **fee of \$12** so you don't have to spend considerable more on materials you might or might not use again. If you want to make postcards she will have Peltex for purchase. Don't forget your glasses!

- -Appliqué press sheet or parchment paper, but will be provided if needed
- -Fabrics to paint on! Solids, near solids, prints, dark (black) and light, "why did I buy it" fabrics
- -Fabrics for appliqué! Bring leftover fabrics in any size, shape, and color. The wider your selection, the more choices you will have
- -Cutting and ironing supplies, if available but we will share
 - -Basic sewing kit plus paper and embroidery scissors
 - -\$12 fee for supplies—pay instructor

Optional Supplies for fun stuff: bring some, all or none, as you wish.....but the more you

have to play with the more fun it is!!

- -freezer paper and scrap paper for testing out ideas
- -exacto knife to cut stencils
- -stamps, rubbing plates, sponges, brushes, if you have any
- -large plastic bag to use underneath your work and protect the tables
- -a few paper towels for finger tips
- -plastic plate, masking tape
